

The National Archery in the Schools Program[®], NASP[®], a target archery program,

was developed to be part of the Physical Education curriculum for students grades 4-12. The success of the program is reflected in its popularity, **2.4 million students ANNUALLY at 14,442 schools, in 46 states and 11 countries** have participated in the NASP[®] program, and it's growing. The reasons for its popularity among students, teachers and administrators are the positive attributes it brings to the classroom. For example, **94% of participating students** like archery because it's a sport they can do. Unlike most sports, success in archery is not based on physical ability, but on individual skill. Teachers like it because it engages students regardless of age, size or gender and helps improve academic performance, attendance and behavior. Administrators like it because it's easy to set up, affordable to start and most importantly it's safe. With the exception of table tennis, archery is the safest sport available. 3.2 million students have participated with **Zero Accidents!**

All you need to do is contact NASP[®] by phone or on the web, to find your State or Provincial NASP Coordinator. Teachers must undergo a 1 day NASP[®] certification course, that's been approved as Professional Development by most education departments. Additionally, many states offer cost-share funding for the NASP[®] archery equipment kit.


