## North Dakota COVID-19 risk level adjusted

Effective at 8 a.m. Friday, Jan. 29, North Dakota's COVID-19 risk level will be changed to "low." This is the second time North Dakota's governor has lowered the state's risk level this month. The state's 14-day positivity rate and number of active cases are at their lowest since August. Face coverings continue to be strongly recommended or required state-wide. **However, to further safety, Mayville State's mask mandate continues. See the details.**

Rapid antigen COVID-19 testing is available to all Mayville State students, faculty, and staff on an ongoing basis. If interested, you'll need to schedule an appointment with Lindsey Hall at <a href="mailto:lindsey.m.hall@mayvillestate.edu">lindsey.m.hall@mayvillestate.edu</a> or 701-788-4865. Watch your email and the digital message boards located around campus for information regarding mass testing options. If you have not pre-registered for COVID-19 testing in the past, you will need to do so at testreg.nd.gov.

All Mayville State students, faculty, and staff are strongly encouraged to test. Testing is one of the best things we can all do to help keep one another safe and well. It's up to each of us to do our part to help mitigate the spread of the virus.

# Great news regarding COVID-19 vaccine availability

Higher education staff, faculty, and administration are included in Phase 1C of the state's COVID-19 vaccine distribution plan. Officials estimate that at current vaccine allocation levels, Phase 1C could begin sometime in May of 2021. While they are hopeful that Phase 1C will be reached in May, officials have acknowledged the importance of maintaining stability within the higher education system. For that reason, if the state has not reached Phase 1C by July 1, 2021, North Dakota will reprioritize vaccinations to higher education to ensure that all staff, faculty, and administration have the opportunity to be vaccinated prior to the start of the fall 2021 semester.

In the meantime, all higher education faculty, staff, administration, and students who meet the Phase 1B requirements are encouraged to register for vaccination as soon as it is made available. Phase 1B includes individuals 65 and older with one or more high-risk medical condition, persons with two or more high-risk medical conditions (regardless of age), child care workers, and workers of preschool and kindergarten through grade 12. Phase 1B includes Mayville State's Child Development Programs staff.
